## RESEARCH

## UPDATE (1):

Since 2019, we have supported Nanda Wirawan, a weaver from West Sumatra, in participating in the 7th Symposium in Yogyakarta. We are pleased that Nanda has made significant progress since then and continues to research the Canduang songket.

In June 2023, Nanda held a solo exhibition of her work, showcasing documentation and archival resources she had gathered. The exhibition, titled "Canduang: The Forgotten Center of Songket Weaving," received positive feedback from both the textile community and the public. The event was officiated by TTASSEA, alongside Tuan Gadih Pagaruyung, Prof. Dr. Puti Reno Rhaudatul Jannah Thaib, the Chair of the *Bundo Kanduang* Association of West Sumatra.

In the framework of the exhibition, Nanda organized workshops and weaving classes and delivered lectures at high schools in West Sumatra. She also spoke at cultural institutions, such as the Himpunan Wastraprema in Jakarta in June of this year. The exhibition resulted in a published book, and soon, she plans to write a comprehensive large-scale book on the Songket of her village. Given the promising outlook, TTASSEA is committed to providing ongoing support to her in the year ahead.

## UPDATE (2)


Since 2019, TTASSEA has been supporting Tjok Istri Ratnacora S. from Bali in her pivotal research on the essential, yet often overlooked, *Bebali* cloth, a key element in Hindu Balinese rituals. Her work has successfully culminated in a book, a dynamic fashion show, and a strong theatrical presentation.

Ratna has effectively created sustainable fashion that merges the striped *Bebali* designs with traditional *kain blacu* (calico weavings), redefining it as art fashion. To fully appreciate this innovative approach and presentation, watch the video titled "*Tutur Bumi*" (The Earth Speaks), a powerful art performance intertwined with art fashion of 100-year-old textiles. In this way, Ratna dedicates her work to preserving the heritage of *Bebali* textiles. Additionally, Ratna played a pivotal role as the main editor of the book WASTRA BALI (Balinese Textiles) by Putri Suastini Koster (2023).

## UPDATE (3):

In 2013, TTASSEA made a partnership with the Lampung Tapis Weavers, sisters Roslina Daan and Rostini Isa, who were key members of our delegation to the 4th ATTS. This year, we reunited with them at the WIC Bazaar on November 13th, where we witnessed firsthand the significant progress they've achieved since our initial collaboration. They have expanded their network of weavers, producing a diverse range of Lampung textiles, and have established multiple branches to effectively market their products. Moreover, they are committed to supporting other local institutions in the promotion of Lampung products, showcasing their dedication to uplifting the community.

The updates from these groups of skilled Indonesian textile artisans suggest that our support in future textile projects will be valuable not only for our society but also for the Indonesian textile community.

#### **NEW RESEARCH**

Research at TTASSEA has been progressing since May 2024. During a visit to the Indo-Pacific collection at the Yale Art Gallery at the end of 2023, we were impressed by the many ancient Indonesian textiles in the gallery that have become extinct in Indonesia. In addition, the age of the carbon-dated textiles in the collection is particularly remarkable.



While visiting the Yale Art Gallery's collection, TTASSEA researchers have identified a significant collection of textiles from various regions of Indonesia that needs further study. Understanding the cultural importance of these textiles to the history of Indonesian textiles, we believe that the research should primarily be conducted by local researchers from the regions where these textiles originated. Collaboration with experts in Indonesian culture—will enhance the research efforts.

We are initiating a research project on two textiles: one from North Sulawesi and another from Lampung. Our objective is to evaluate which area offers greater accessibility in terms of information and communication related to these textiles. Given the limited existing literature, we need to gather comprehensive information. We will begin with an in-depth literature review to ensure we have accurate and reliable data. Concurrently, we are actively consulting with local cultural and textile experts in Minahasa (North Sulawesi) and Lampung (South Sumatra).

## **CROSS-FUNCTIONAL COLLABORATION**

This year, TTASSEA successfully signed memorandums of understanding (MOUs) with two leading institutions of higher learning. Our first collaboration was with BINUS, or Bina Nusantara University, a prestigious private university in Jakarta. They play a key role in establishing a new website for TTASSEA, a vital platform that will significantly enhance our presence and strengthen our communication with textile organizations, artisans, and other stakeholders. We are actively engaged in this partnership with BINUS, and we have scheduled the launch of the new website for the first quarter of 2025.

## **INTERNATIONAL SEMINAR**

A free international seminar was held on August 5, 2024, featuring Dr. Lesley Pullen from SOAS the School of Asian Studies, London presenting her research "Evidence of Textiles on Indonesian Sculptures of the Hindu-Buddhist Period". The sculptures, originating from the 8th to the 15th century, serve as a powerful testament to the rich heritage of early Javanese textile art.

This important seminar provides a thorough examination of the diverse designs represented on the garments worn by gods, goddesses, and deified royalty in religious imagery, significantly enhancing our understanding of this vital cultural contribution.

Dr. Pullen's presentation is significant because there are no other visual media, such as paintings or illuminated manuscripts, that depict textile patterns from that period. The virtual textiles displayed on the statues were emphasized through detailed hand-drawn illustrations, which highlighted the textile motifs and made them more prominent.

The seminar was a tremendous success, with over 200 attendees, including students from the School of Art and Design, fashion designers, collectors, and other enthusiasts of Indonesian textiles.





## **IN-KIND DONATION**

In September, we proudly accepted a nearly 100-year-old *Tangkuluak*, a Minangkabau headdress, from Sita van Bemmelen, a valued friend of our Society. This remarkable heirloom belonged to a sister of her grandmother, who lived in West Sumatra between 1926 and 1932. Sita was determined to return the heirloom to its rightful place and sought our expertise for its donation to a museum. The cloth is identified as a headdress from the Padang Magek area in Tanah Datar. The Adityawarman Museum in Padang was chosen as the recipient, confirming they did not yet have a *Tangkuluak* from that region in their collection.

TTASSEA is proud to have played a key role in the donation of this ancient *Tangkuluak*, reinforcing our commitment to the heritage and education of the younger generation in West Sumatra. We firmly believe that initiatives like this are vital in supporting both individuals and public institutions.

## **BI-ANNUAL ASEAN TRADITIONAL TEXTILE SYMPOSIUM**

The ASEAN Traditional Textile Symposium (ATTS) is an essential initiative led by textile enthusiasts of TTASSEA focused on preserving traditional textiles across Southeast Asia. Launched in Jakarta in 2005 with support from the ASEAN Secretariat, the inaugural symposium was a remarkable success and attracted over 120 dedicated textile aficionados who insisted on making it a regular event to benefit textile artisans, researchers, and collectors world-wide.

Following the success in Jakarta, the second ATTS was hosted in Manila by HABI and the Museum Foundation of the Philippines, followed by gatherings in Terengganu, Vietnam, Thailand, Brunei Darussalam, Yogyakarta, Putrajaya Malaysia, and this year, Laos. The momentum is strong, demonstrating a relentless commitment to this vital cause.

## 9th ASEAN TRADITIONAL TEXTILE SYMPOSIUM – Vientiane, Lao PDR

The 9<sup>th</sup> ASEAN Traditional Textile Symposium aims to promote traditional textile practices and cultural heritage in the ASEAN region. Featuring panel presentations, exhibitions, and discussions, the event will showcase expertise from local, regional, and international textile experts, including weavers, designers, and researchers. Speakers from Southeast Asian countries will present their traditional textiles, and exhibitors will display regional artifacts. Scholars, museum professionals, and artisans will also participate, focusing on strategies for preserving and displaying textiles in museums.

TTASSEA is actively engaged this year in supporting the host country with the organization of the 9th ASEAN Traditional Textile Symposium (ATTS). This significant event will take place in Vientiane, Laos PDR, from November 3 to 6, 2024, in the Grand Ballroom of the Landmark Hotel. As Laos assumes the role of Chair of ASEAN in 2024, the symposium was hosted by the Laos Handicraft Association. It is essential to note that there were two concurrent symposia at the same venue: the 9th ATTS and the 8<sup>th</sup> Symposium of International Association for Studies of the Silk Road Textiles (IASSRT).

#### THE SYMPOSIUM SCHEDULE

The Symposium was inaugurated by Madame Naly Sisoulith, the esteemed spouse of the Lao President. Following her, key officials made impactful remarks, including, Ms. Chantao Phamthammavong the honorary president of the Lao Handicraft Association, GKBRAA Paku Alam, the president of the Traditional Textile Arts Society of Southeast Asia, and Prof. Feng Zhao, who serves as the president of the International Association for Studies of Silk Road Textiles. Their presence underscored the significance of the event and commitment to promoting traditional textiles.

Keynote speakers were Ms. Viengkham Nanthavongdouangsy, speaking about Lao textile knowledge behind the Art. The second keynote speaker was Dr. Linda McIntosh speaking about Silk Road Connections in Laos and Southeast Asia. While Dr Komaruddin Kudya as speaker representing Indonesia, Ms.Nuryanti Widya from Batik Komar Bandung, and Mr. Torang Sitorus were the Exhibitors at the Laos Symposium.

Following the official opening, participants engaged in a vibrant textile exhibition that showcased the rich diversity of textiles from all ASEAN countries. This exhibition included impressive demonstrations of various decoration techniques and offered a selection of books and textiles for sale.
